


EDUCATION REPORT

Dear Squadron/Club Members,



The Radar Course is one of the best I have seen or taken. It is clearly not only for the owners of radar equipped boats. The Course goes into detail on radar but also covers integration of boat electronic systems and their interface. This is most useful as small craft electronics tend to be controlled by multifunction displays leaving the older independent, stand-alone systems. The Course also brilliantly covers collision avoidance using all available means. I recommend this course to all boaters and especially all our instructors!

At present I have completed self-study of the Course. I was very familiar with the original first edition that I bought when published in 2004. It was one of my must have texts on board our Nordhavn 40 trawler in the Pacific Northwest. I wish I could have taken this course when we worked on the specs for the electronics of our Back Cove 37 in 2013-2014.

Magellan Society Kicks Off Its Eleventh Year

There are two rules in overseeing a boating program. Rule Number 1 - You can't trust the weatherman. Rule Number 2 - Repeat Rule Number 1.

Predictions of late morning and mid-afternoon thundershowers were fortunately ignored by 28 members in six boats who consequently circumnavigated Buck Island and lunch at Fish Camp, thereby kicking off the 2019 Magellan Society cruise schedule.

The raison d'etre of the Magellan Society is to provide ABCHH members who are new to boating in our local waters with knowledge of the back channels, tides and currents throughout our area. In keeping with that philosophy, today's cruise first charted the depth of the mouth of Broad Creek by transiting it from Bram Point to Buck Island's north end. We observed that the greatest depth was at the "Idle Speed" ATON mid-way between the two tips of land. We were also fortunate to observe the Haig Point Ferry enter Broad Creek, keeping 6"31" on its port side. Since we were virtually at high tide, we were 6 feet above mean lower low. Hence the belief of some sailors that low tide forces them to leave Broad Creek via the cutoff between Caliboque Cay and Buck Island.

Having measured the depth of the mouth of Broad Creek, the group then explored the channel between Calibogue Cay and Buck Island, maintaining "no wake" speed per the posted buoys. We observed the various docks and boats on the Calibogue Cay side, some still in a state of disrepair due to Hurricane Matthew. We also viewed the exclusive residence located on Buck Island for which one crew member looked up the sale price at a whopping \$5.9 asking price. Our final observation was that the southern end of Buck Island's marsh extends quite far south, necessitating a long ride to 6 "1" before turning north again.

The group ended the day with a great lunch at Fish Camp, located adjacent to Broad Creek Marina. Well fed, we all returned to our respective marinas.

Next Up: Circumnavigation of Pinckney Island on Thursday, May 9^{th} . "First Call" to be initiated later this month. Save the date!
