Boys & Girls Club - Day on The Water July 9, 2019 Submitted by P/C Barb Sommers



Once again this year, as a community service, America's Boating Club of Hilton Head will sponsor a "Day on the Water" for the Bluffton Boys & Girls Club.

We are looking for five (5) ABCHH captains to participate in this year's "Day On The Water" program with the Boys & Girls Club on July 9. The program takes local kids out on the water for an educational cruise and lunch. Highlights of the program:

- The children are between 12 and 18 years of age. They are graduates of the BGC's "Explorer" Program, a summer intensive program that includes physical fitness, personal development and leadership skills.
- Two-hour "sea school" at the Boys & Girls Club a week prior to the cruise. Attendance is optional for ABCHH members.
- Half-day cruise on July 9 (9A to 3P) with lunch at the Quarterdeck in Harbour Town. ABCHH covers lunch for the Boys & Girls Club; captains and crew go dutch treat.
- Limit of two ABCHH members per boat: (1) Captain, (2) Crewman
- Crewmen assist with docking; pointing out things of interest that are covered in sea school; answering questions; and generally helping the captain manage the kids.
- Each boat will have four to five Explorers aboard.
- Two or three Boys & Girls Club staff will accompany the group.
- Captain and Crew share fuel cost.

All ABCHH volunteers in the "Day on The Water" are subject to a background check. This is a firm policy of the Boys & Girls Club, local schools, churches and other organizations working with minors. The background check is a database search administered by a third-party firm. Required information for the search: Name, address, length of residence, age, driver's license number and social security number. Both captain and crew must undergo a background check.

"Day On The Water" is a popular ABCHH program with a surplus of volunteers. This year we will let captains select their ABCHH crewman. If you want to participate as a captain, please respond quickly along with the name of your crewman. Right now, we have space for only five boats. Captains will be assigned on a "first come, first served basis".

AMBER KUEHN - LOCAL MARINE BIOLOGIST & SEA TURTLE PATROL WOMAN

The June 11th dinner meeting was held at our newest dinner location - inside the Hilton Head Golf & Country Club's Magnolia Room within Hilton Head Plantation on. Some fifty members and guests attended the dinner where they enjoyed beef tenderloin brochettes or airline chicken breast. Several diners thought the carrots were some of the best they've ever eaten (myself included).

The speaker for the evening was our very own, homegrown, Amber Kuehn. Amber is a well known and renowned marine biologist, who is a fourth generation Bluffton resident. Amber graduated with a Biology degree from the University of Georgia in 1997 and became a professional boat captain in 1999. She started working with the Sea Turtle Patrol on Hilton Head Island in 1998-2001 and went on to graduate school to complete her master's degree in Marine Biology from Nova Southeastern University Oceanographic Center in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. She studied leatherback, green, and loggerhead sea turtles nesting on Broward County Beaches.

In 2004 Amber moved to Maui for a career in the diving industry and to study green and hawksbill sea turtles. She completed her master's degree in Marine Biology in 2005.

Husband in tow, she returned to the Low Country in 2006 and has been with the Sea Turtle Patrol on Hilton Head Island for 13 consecutive seasons and currently manages the program. 2019 will be her 21st season working on sea turtle nesting beaches.

In a recent article in "The Island Packet" it was reported that Hilton Head hit a record 250 sea turtle nests. A Kemp's Ridley sea turtle nested on a Hilton Head Island beach on April 26th - marking not only the first nest of the 2019 season, but the first nest ever laid by the rare sea turtle species on Hilton Head Island. The 250 nests are just over half the total number of nests in 2018. If you're talking about sea turtles, this summer is shaping up to be a historic one for our local island. It's estimated that there are about 25,000 sea turtle eggs currently incubating around the island.

This year's "strawless summer" begins on July 1st. If you see anyone ditching a plastic straw on the beach, please retrieve it to keep the straws out of our local waterways. They can threaten our wildlife just If your walking the beach at the end of the day and happen to see a large hole left unfilled, kick some sand back in the hole because if left open it will threaten sea turtles that are making their first journey to the ocean. Any large holes left unfilled can trap baby sea turtles making their way to the sea. The "strawless summer" is much like the ban on plastic bags. They're still making their way onto our beaches in spite of the local ban, so please pick them up and put them in the trash containers. 100,000 marine animals are killed by plastic bags annually.

Amber is an active volunteer for the South Carolina Marine Mammal Stranding Network in Beaufort County, and she performs dolphin necropsies in the field for NOS (National Oceanic Services, a division of NOAA). She also received an award from SCDNR in 2014 for her dedication to sea turtle stranding response.

Amber owns Spartina Marine Education Charters; she operates a US Coast Guard certified vessel carrying 20 passengers. She educates tourists and locals on the unique ecosystem in the Low Country marshland - in her own back yard.

Amber was so full of knowledge that it seeped from her pores, and she has an absolutely great sense of humor. The audience was captivated with her presentation and hung on every word. For those of you who missed the dinner, if you ever have an opportunity to hear Amber speak, you owe it to yourself to listen.
