



This year the Boating Activity cruises led by Barb Sommers have allowed us to explore new places — like the Savannah Yacht Club, Fripp Island and the Port Royal Maritime Museum. Importantly, we visited some great places for lunch. A special note of appreciation to Barb for volunteering to be the Boating Activity chair this year. Additionally, thanks to Bob Newbert for leading the "Day on the Water" cruise for the Bluffton Boys and Girls Club for the second year in a row and getting a great article on the event published by a local Bluffton newspaper.

Administration: Last year, our Administrative Officer Mark Larson together with Paul Hoyte conducted a survey to better understand the needs of our membership. Additionally, Paul has made some great IT contributions, which include moving us to payment by credit card, using Dropbox to store key data, and building a new website.

Bluffton Boys & Girls Club treated to day on the water

A "flotilla" of four boats took off Friday morning from Skull Creek Marina with special crews on board for a day full of fun and learning.

Graduates of the Bluffton Boys & Girls Club Explorers program boot camp were treated to the day on Beaufort County waterways by the Hilton Head Sail and Power Squadron.

The Hilton Head Sail and Power Squadron is a nonprofit whose emphasis is boating safety, education and enjoyment of local waterways. It offers classes and seminars on safe boating and leads cruises throughout the area.

This is the second year the squadron has taken Boys & Girls Club members boating.

Before heading out on Friday, the Boys & Girls Club members were provided with an orientation that included an overview of boats and things they would see on the cruise, including landmarks, historical sites and wildlife.

The Day on the Water event was started and organized by squadron member captain Bob Newbert.

"Tourists from around the country visit Beaufort County to fish, swim and boat in our waters," Newbert said. "But many local youth have never been on a boat; and some, believe it or not, have never seen the water."

The youth have worked hard at the boot camp and deserve a reward, Newbert said. The Explorer program is held by the Bluffton Police Department.

"I have as much fun as the kids, and so do the other captains. We all love the water and especially love sharing it with others," Newbert said.

The boot camp is a summer leadership and character development program that includes community service with physical training, such as pushups and running a mile.

The cruise included stops at several areas on the way to Harbour Town on Hilton Head Island, where the group stopped for lunch.

Stops included the Windmill Harbour locks, Port Royal Sound, Spanish Wells, Pinckney Island and the Harbour Town yacht basin.

Newbert provided history lessons of the Battle of Port Royal and Pinckney Island National Wildlife Refuge.

Newbert pointed out that when there were freed slaves on Hilton Head during the Civil War, Bluffton's black population was still enslaved within eyesight across the water.

Crew members learned that Pinckney Island was once the site of a large plantation growing Sea Island cotton, considered the finest in the world.

The Quarterdeck restaurant at Harbour Town helped provide lunch for the Explorers and also treated the group to ice cream and a trip up to the top of Harbour Town lighthouse.

Explorer members also learned some interesting facts about pelicans (they hit prey with their heads to knock them out) and bottlenose dolphins (they sleep with half of their brains awake and one eye open), and tried their hand at setting some crab pots (apparently, crabs prefer chicken necks to turkey necks.)

"I never get tired of seeing dolphins, but to watch the kids see them for the first time is special," Newbert said. "We talk about them in our Day On The Water orientation session, but there's a huge difference between looking at them on screen in a classroom and seeing one swim toward you in the wild."

Some of the biggest laughs and smiles of the day came when each Explorer got a chance to take the helm of the boat.

"That was fun!" Emily Davis said after her turn.

Davis, a rising seventh-grader, said she was nervous at first when traveling over the wakes of other boats, but that quickly turned to several "wow" moments.

Craig Washington, a rising eighth-grader, had just as much fun when it was his turn, he said. "That was cool," Washington said.

Manuel Herrera, heading to the 10th grade, took the trip last year and served as the Newbert's crew "radioman."

Squadron member captain Walker Kirk was also part of the MaryAnn crew for the day.


Boys & Girls Club director Molly O. Smith was on board and also took a turn at the helm. Smith said this trip is the highlight of summer for the boys and girls.

"Miss Molly says we do not understand the lasting impact we have on the lives of these kids," Newbert said. "I don't know about long-term, but I do know that for one day anyway, strangers young and old come together to have fun and enjoy the beauty of the Lowcountry with each other."

Also helping to make the day a success was the Freedom Boat Club. Cash Mullen was thanked for providing gas for all the boats. The club also provided some of the boats.

Upon returning to Skull Creek, all Explorer members were presented with a Day on the Water certificate and a squadron hat.





Dick Herrin conducted 12 VSC's and ten of them passed


Robert McKenzie performed two VSC's with both of them passing.


