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

These new members were introduced at the dinner meeting on January 15th, which was held at Red Fish on Hilton Head Island. The group enjoyed a social hour and dinner, which was followed by our guest speaker for the evening - Al Stokes from the Waddell Mariculture Center in Bluffton. Mr. Stokes has been the manager and a wildlife biologist at Waddell for thirty years. He received the Meritorious Service Award from the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources in September 2017. He was presented with a plaque in November that named the main building at Waddell the "Alvin D. Stokes Building." Al is a graduate of Clemson University.

- Al feels that maintaining good water quality is an important aspect of the protection of the environment.
- Keeping waterways clear of bacteria is cheaper than trying to fix a problem down the road.
- Al and his staff constantly develop tools to track the fish population in the area.
- All assisted the Clemson University professors in surveys and research which consisted of identifying the South Carolina fish.
- Al conducts lectures to roughly 3,000 people each year about mariculture.
- Al and his staff have done more to maintain and improve our local fishery than most fishermen know.
- Waddell provides a 'scientific boost' to local fishery and is the secret weapon the Low Country deploys to keep Low Country fishing alive and well for all of us.
- The work done at Waddell is valuable to South Carolina's waters and is important because of the pressure that is placed on our environment by development, commercial fishing, and tourism.



Blue Bird, Indigo, and Vita Brevis boat on...

The boats left Hilton Head Island at 9 a.m. on January 5th and arrived at St. Simon at 2:20 p.m. Despite the cold weather, they reported calm water and traveled some 117 miles at an average speed of 20 mph. Vita Brevis encountered an issue with its electronic compass. The group enjoyed a nice dinner at Morningstar Marina.





Saturday, January 6th the boats pressed on to St. Augustine Municipal Marina, which is right on the ICW, without any mishaps. A boat tech from Coastal Carolina Yachts was waiting at the marina to deliver a new electronic compass to Vita Brevis. That means Chip and Brenda's chart plotter will actually be pointing in the direction a travel, which is always a plus. The last of the ice that had accumulated on the boats in Hilton Head had melted so all in all it was a good day for boating.

It was a good run from St. Augustine to Titusville on Sunday, January 7th. The trip took a little longer than anticipated due to a long stretch of manatee protected waters. Gotta protect those big babies! By the time they arrived in Titusville the temperature had soared to almost 60 degrees! They continued their tradition of a rotating cocktail party aboard Blue Bird. After dinner they hustled back to the marina to see a rocket launch from Cape Canaveral.

As of this writing the three boats and crew members are due to arrive in Ft. Myers on January 10th. Their arrival in Stuart on January 8th was hampered by heavy rain, which slowed them down. Chart plotters and Sirius weather were important aids to their progress. The rain was a welcome relief as it washed all the salt off the boats. The weather in Stuart allowed them to leave doors and windows open and enjoy some warm weather for a change. January 9th they crossed Lake Okeechobee via five locks and reached Ft. Myers a day ahead of schedule. The trip from Ft. Myers to Punta Gorda featured many islands. All boats arrived safely in Punta Gorda and the temperature was in the seventies.
