Drew bought the first lot in Wexford and built a home, which he lived in for 32 years. He and Diane now live on their boat, the "Rambling Wreck," in Harbour Town. Today there are 460 homes with either marsh, lagoon, golf course or harbor views. Seven bridges were built spanning lagoons and the harbor; four islands were formed to support island home sites. Only two other communities on the East Coast have lock-controlled harbors. Wexford's design was inspired by an article in National Geographic about the inland canals of Ireland. Cruise attendees enjoyed a lovely lunch in the club house before their departure. Thank you, Barb Sommers, for another great cruise.


